

A Chat with... Bonnie Strebel, Principal Library Clerk By Doniso Micalo

What led you to this position at the Library?

Although I grew up in Tiverton, my family has enjoyed using the Westport Library since I was eight years old. Sue (Branco) was the Children's Librarian at the time and Jane (Young) helped me with my school projects. Reading was big in our home and I spent quite a bit of time here. I began subbing here eight years ago after finishing high school. I am just finishing my BA in English at Southern New Hampshire University and then plan to obtain a Master's in Library Science.

What are the most significant changes you have noticed through the years?

SAILS and the ebooks are the biggest changes. Computer technology has increased the Library's ability to meet the needs of its patrons and provide more opportunity for reading and sharing books. I use Overdrive to download eBooks for myself so I've been able to help patrons set up their accounts for their eReaders or their tablets. This opens up a whole section of the Library to our patrons where books and videos can be instantly downloaded from home. I'll always prefer real books myself, but having the option to download a library book without leaving your home is great for those times when you are unable to get to the Library.

What is your favorite part of Library Science?

I like the archival aspect—researching and cataloging—I could see myself eventually working in a college library or a museum as an archivist.

Any best part of your work here?

My favorite part is that I get to do so many different things every day. No day is typical and I'm always learning new things.

What types of books do you like to read?

I'll read almost any genre if the story grabs my attention. Lately, I've been reading mostly mysteries and some non-fiction. I recently read *The Girls of Atomic City: The Untold Story of The Women Who Helped with World War II* by Denise Keirnan and really enjoyed it. My favorite book of all is *Little House on the Prairie* by Laura Ingalls Wilder which I read as a child.

As someone with a lifelong love of reading, what is your advice for parents and guardians to instill that love in their children? Find a subject that interests your child and then search for books in that area. Be persistent and don't give up in working to find books that your child enjoys.

The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt

December 12:

Canada by Richard Ford

World of Books

Fidophilia

Who doesn't love a good dog story? Okay, maybe cat people. Dog haters. Phobics. But dogs are definitely on the rise in letters. Memoirs, mysteries, poignant novels, comic novels, philosophical discourses, narratives of dogs' noble exploits in war, in search and rescue, in search and recovery (dead people), as therapeutic lifesavers. Used to be an author had to include a girl or woman somewhere to ensure that quintile of readership; nowadays it's a dog.

Asked to look at recent dog book series, however, I soon find myself casting about for some more enlightening task, say removing window screens (which is truly enlightening as they are all heavily laced with fine dog hairs sown by the crosswinds of open panes). Tearing myself away from that useful work I face a near-Congressional Library of dog books written from or for the modern notion of family as anything with a beating heart and a set of eyes, never mind soft fur and uncomplicated adoration.

It's hard to better the classics—works of Albert Payson Terhune, Jack London, James Herriot; Virginia Woolf's *Flush*, Eric Knight's *Lassie-Come-Home*, Sheila Burnford's *The Incredible Journey*, Eleanor Atkinson's *Greyfriars Bobby*, the essays of James Thurber or E. B. White. Setting those aside for the moment, two of the current heavyweights in the lightweight genre of dog mystery series are the Chet and Bernie books of Spencer Quinn (a.k.a. crime thriller suspense novelist Peter Abrahams), and the Andy Carpenter series by David Rosenfelt.

Chet the dog narrates the Quinn mysteries. His human partner is Bernie Little—theirs is the Little Detective Agency. Chet's voice is reliably doggy—not small furry *homo sapiens*—and most of the wit and even wisdom follows from this. He is literal-minded, eager to please, easily distracted and quick to jump to conclusions—but, as he is fond of repeating, "I bring other things to the table," chief among these being a vastly superior sense of smell. Though the books are usually set in Arizona, the recent *Paw and Order* takes place in Washington, D.C. where Bernie's love interest Suzie has taken a job at the *Washington Post*. The subject matter of each of the seven books is different and often interesting, but the formula for the chase and its pitfalls—most often caused and heroically resolved by Chet—are comfortingly the same. Satisfying light reads, they probably are best not taken all at once.

David Rosenfelt's Andy Carpenter series is less slavishly doggy and perhaps the better read. The wit, and there is plenty, is from the human narrator whose smart-alecky tone owes much to the late Robert Parker. *Hounded*, the most recent book of the series, reintroduces favorite characters, graceful plot twists, and the possibility of a new direction for the next book. True, this one has less involvement of the dogs but they are a believable element in the story and come with an endearing eight-year old boy.

I said I was setting aside the classics for the moment. That moment has now passed. Martha White, granddaughter of E. B. White, edits the best dog book I have found this year: *E. B. White on Dogs*. Here is White describing his Norwich Terrier:

Everybody tries to like Jones. But Jones takes his guard duties seriously and has made several attempts to kill people he thought were intruding. He particularly distrusts women in trousers, drivers of panel trucks, small children, and stray dogs. He has hunted squirrels for six years without bagging one...Sometimes I dream of owning another Norwich—one that looks like a Norwich and behaves like one. But I am known for my outsize dreams. Meanwhile, I am grateful for small favors, like the little brown one over there on the sofa.

Mystery Spotlight

Author Louise Penny

Canadian mystery writer and *New York Times* best-selling author Louise Penny may not be as well-known as of some her American counterparts of the mystery genre but her novels are refreshingly different. These mystery novels are written from a Canadian viewpoint. Her books have reached an international audience and are popular in England and the United States as well Canada.

Louise Penny began her career as a radio host and journalist for the Canadian Broadcasting System but later in life she decided to retire from that milieu and concentrate on writing. Always a fan of mystery stories since she was a child, she found her talent for writing a good crime story. Her books are set in a reclusive village called Three Pines, Quebec, near the Vermont border and populated with a host of interesting town characters all revolving around the respected and dignified Chief Inspector Armand Gamache of the Sûreté du Québec, the provincial police force for that Canadian province.

For readers interested in Louise Penny books, there is a series of ten books written since 2005.

If you want continuity when reading each book, the list below is chronological but each story can stand alone. The tenth book in the series, *The Long Way Home*, was released this past August.


